AGTA has developed an Action Plan:

- Posters - development of a new set of classroom posters. These will be available for purchase from Affiliates and directly from AGTA
 - AGTA Roadshow – further implementation of the travelling roadshow to support the implementation of geography in the classroom. The aim is to offer the roadshow in each state as many times as required
 - Textbook - AGTA is seeking to produce a text book to support the implementation of the AC:Geography. This will help support the development of the key skills and inquiry methodology.
 - Brochure - the development of a reproducible resource for use in schools
- advocating for the range of careers that the study of Geography can support. Useful in subject counselling and careers events.
- Work with RGSQ regarding the Geography competition in order to further develop the project and to initiate a primary school version.
 - Response to HASS – AGTA has already developed a response to the AC: Geography review and is continuing to respond to the push for a single HASS curriculum. The AGTA Board will monitor and respond to further developments.

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Don Biddle Award — Wayne Sutton

The Don Biddle Friend of Geography Award is named in honour of the founding president of AGTA, Dr Don Biddle. The Award is made by the AGTA Board based on the recommendation of a selection committee comprising three members of the Board. Current serving members of the AGTA Board are not eligible to receive the award.

It was awarded posthumously to Wayne Sutton in recognition of the enormous contribution he made to AGTA and to the consolidation of geography within Tasmania.

His citation reads:

At the time of his passing Wayne was president of the Tasmanian Geography Teachers Association and a director of AGTA. In these positions, and his teaching career more generally, Wayne made an outstanding contribution to Geographical Education in Australia.

Wayne was passionate about Geography and was actively involved in providing leadership and support to Geography teachers throughout Tasmania. He taught Senior Geography at Hobart College for 18 years where he was Head of Department. He was the chief marking examiner and had been the setting examiner and state moderator for Geography. In addition, Wayne was a contributing author for several publications and held positions on advisory editorial committees for a number of publications. He actively promoted professional learning by facilitating a range of Geography workshops and in-service activities.

Wayne was also a long-standing member of the AGTA Board. In this capacity he represented the interests of Tasmanian Geography teachers and took an active interest in issues affecting Geography at a national level.

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These included the development of the Australian Curriculum: Geography, the initiatives AGTA developed to support the Curriculum's implementation and those designed promote the study of Geography in Schools.

In reflecting on Wayne's contribution to AGTA his fellow directors highlighted his zest for life, quiet considered manner and his passionate commitment to Geography. They also appreciated his wry sense of humour, and his thoughtful comments and diplomatic solutions to issues faced by AGTA.

Wayne was a kind, considerate and deeply caring person. His fellow directors valued his friendship and will miss his keen sense of humour and his contributions to the Board's deliberations.

Wayne is a very worthy recipient of the Don Biddle Award, AGTA's most prestigious award. He taught and treasured Geography.

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Australian Primary Principals Association

Australian Primary Principals Association has presented a position paper regarding the Primary Curriculum design and the range of subjects to be taught. It is an interesting piece regarding the concerns about the overcrowded primary curriculum. Briefly the Association is advocating the integration of History and Geography as part of a Humanities and Social Sciences (HASS) course which would be a part of the core. AGTA does not support the development of a single curriculum for HASS, preferring to see the integration of subjects made at a school level from well developed and detailed individual curricula.

GTANSW

Currently, membership is just over 500 with the 2015 Committee being 21 members – 19 from NSW and 2 from ACT. Susan Caldis is completing her second year as President.

Professional Development

Currently, there are 5 confirmed professional development events for 2015. We are working towards gaining registration of these events so teachers can work towards fulfil accreditation requirements.

GTANSW was represented as part of the AGTA Roadshow professional learning opportunity held in Brisbane during March 2015. GTANSW is planning to host three AGTA Roadshows around NSW once NSW BOSTES have released the newly refined curriculum.

The Dubbo Mini Conference 'From the ground up' was held in February with 98 attendees. The focus of the conference was on geographical mapping skills, the use of spatial technologies and integrating fieldwork methodologies.

The HSC Review series was also held during March at 3 venues: Newcastle, Wollongong and Sydney, organized by David Latimer.

GHTANT

Geography teachers in the Northern Territory continue to be excited about their implementation of the Australian Curriculum: Geography and have responded well to professional learning opportunities provided by the association.

The AGTA Conference in New Zealand has done much to promote Geography in the top end of Darwin. Three teachers from Darwin attended, which are similar numbers to the Adelaide and Perth AGTA Conferences. The presentation by Christine Cox at the Curriculum Café highlighted the diverse

fieldtrips and workshops, while showcasing specific strategies and ideas to take back and use in the classroom. The Curriculum Café, held in March, was an after-school information sharing workshop delivered in "15 minute download sessions" with some question time. Other teachers who had been sponsored by GHTANT to attend HTAA and SCEAA conferences were given an opportunity to share resources and report back to members and non-members.

Planning has begun for a joint NT Teaching Associations Conference in late August. GHTANT, STANT (Science Teachers) and ETANT (English Teachers) will provide a range of key note speakers and workshops for both primary and secondary

school teachers across the four disciplines. August is a wonderful time of the year in Darwin, so we are hoping to get participants from all across the Territory attending.

Geography and History Teachers Association of Northern Territory is committed to working with teachers across the whole Territory, and we would encourage more regional teachers to join our association to access both on-line and real-time professional learning opportunities.

Currently GTAQ has 181 financial members but, if the usual pattern prevails, this will increase as the date of the annual Conference draws near. The Conference this year will be held at QUT Gardens Point campus on Saturday July 25 with the theme 'Doing Geography'. A field work day will be offered on the Friday.

GTAQ hosted the first of the AGTA Roadshows at St Margaret's School on Saturday, March 21. About 70 teachers attended, including a small, but keen, group of Primary teachers. Some participants came from far afield, e.g. Cairns, Townsville and Bundaberg. Overall the sessions provided by Grant Kleeman, Malcolm McInerney, John Butler, Susan Caldis and Mick Law were well received.

In September GTAQ will assist RGSQ in the organisation and running of the Big Week Out. Planning is well underway and Rebecca Nicholas has been appointed the Coordinator of the week.

We are still hoping to make greater connections with our regional members and also with the pre-service teachers – the latter of which will be offered free membership in 2015. We have struggled for many years to accommodate the geographical challenges the state of Queensland presents us, maybe this year we will find the 'best fit' to best serve our far-flung membership.

Conference convener Ian Johnson and his sub-committee organised an excellent May 28/29 GTASA Conference 'Grounded in Geography'. Australian Curriculum: Geography continues to be a major focus.

Workshops and field trips aimed at primary and secondary Geography teaching have been organised. Keynote speakers were Mark Lethbridge from Flinders University and John Tibby from Adelaide University. The move to Eventbrite for

Conference registration made the process much more streamlined in 2014 and allowed the conference convener day to day updates. We will continue to use it again this year.

GTASA representatives continue to run workshops at combined association Australian Curriculum Conferences. A spatial technology workshop run by Mick Law from Contour Education will take place in Term 3 and we are also hoping to negotiate an opportunity for AGTA's Travelling Roadshow to present a workshop later in the year.

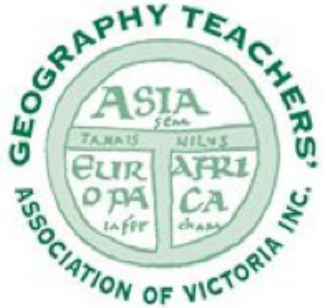

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GTAV

It has been a busy, productive six months for GTAV. Our current member ship stands at 604 with further registrations anticipated.

In the first half of 2015, the GTAV has offered eight professional learning opportunities to experienced and inexperienced teachers of Geography. A further eight briefing sessions were offered in conjunction with the Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority on the forthcoming new senior years' course to be introduced in 2016.

Our Geography Concept Poster sets, for primary and secondary classrooms, continue to sell well and the

support activities for these have been made available on USB. Our other main resources in production this year include four new VCE textbooks and the development of a Spatial Technologies website.

With the closure of the Global Education Program in December 2014, the GTAV is organising the distribution of GEP-produced resources. 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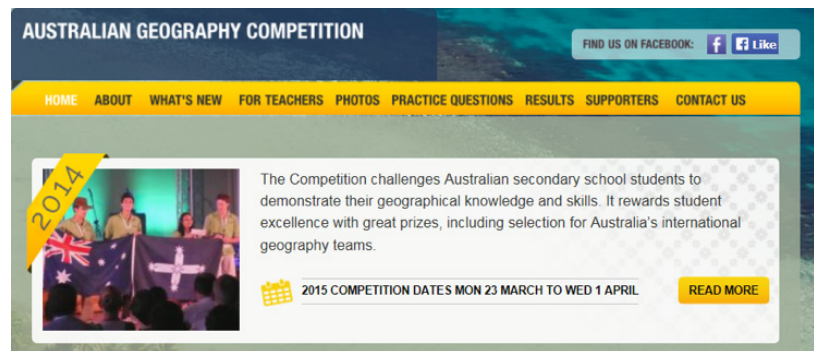
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Australian Geography Competition

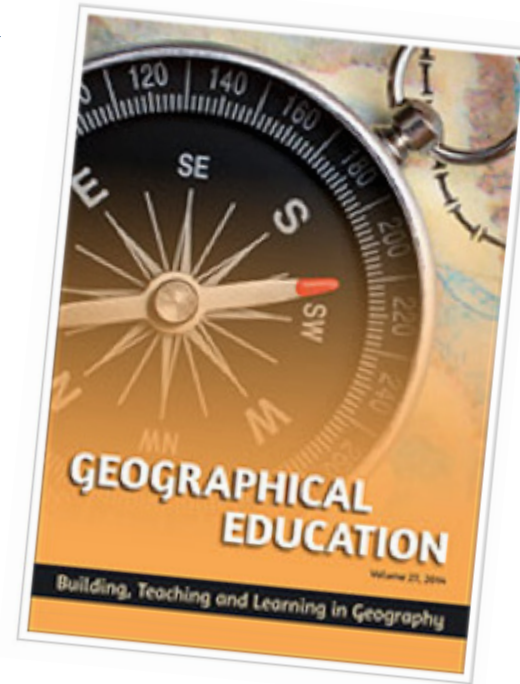

Geographical Education is the flagship journal for the Australian Geography Teachers Association (AGTA). It is published online once a year and contains a raft of articles that connect directly with best practice teaching a delivery of the geography curriculum. It is relevant for all levels of schooling and all the articles are referred making it an academic source for all geography educators. There are also some comprehensive and useful book reviews of new texts or books relevant to geography. The 2014 edition is titled "Building Teaching and Learning in Geography" and challenges the reader to consider the position, importance and relevance of Geography in the curriculum. As usual there are thought provoking articles alongside detail of the submission by AGTA to the review of the Australian Curriculum. 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Geographical Sciences — Decadal Plan

The Australian Academy of Science continues to refine the working party and strategy to develop the decadal plan for the Geographical Sciences. As the chair Associate Professor Alaric Maude is organising working parties to investigate and report on these five strands:

- Living in a changing environment
- Promoting population health and well being
- Managing our food and water assets
- Securing Australia's place in a changing world
- Lifting productivity and economic growth

A range of academics and geography teachers and experts are included in the committee and it is anticipated that during the next two years there will be extensive investigation into the role that geography can play in the further development of Australia. The terms of reference make for interesting reading and it is worthwhile revisiting the project from time to time as it progresses.

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
