Australia Geography Competition 2019

The 2019 Australian Geography Competition was run from Wednesday 27 March to Wednesday 10 April. This timing of the Competition is a return to the end of Term One, at the request of the AGTA Board.

It is pleasing to see the number of schools and students entered in 2019 continues the trend experienced since 2016 of increasing numbers. As at 16 May 2019, the Competition had 73,606 students from 791 schools entered. Table 1 provides a breakdown of entries

by state and territory from 2014 to 2019.

There were 204 schools that entered in 2019 which did not in 2018. Of these, 61 schools had not entered the Competition since it commenced in 1995.

Schools will be contacted about 2019 prize winners, and dispatch of student certificates and results will be completed by the end of June.

The 2019 Geography's Big Week Out (GBWO) will be held from Sunday 15 to Friday 20

December on Kangaroo Island, South Australia. It again is being coordinated by Liam Sloan of the Geography Teachers' Association of South Australia (GTASA) with volunteer assistance from GTASA members and the AGC Committee. We thank Liam for the time and dedication he has put into making this event such a success.

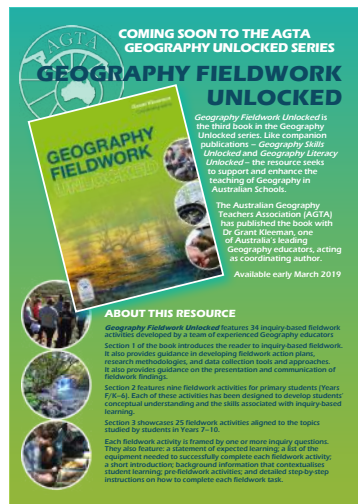

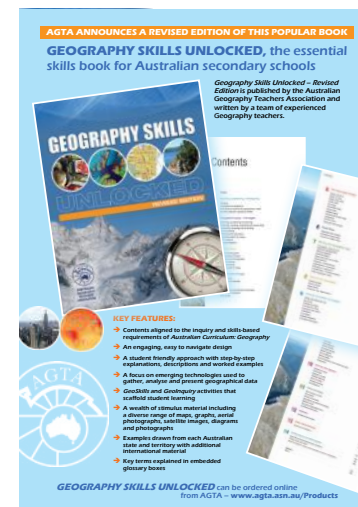

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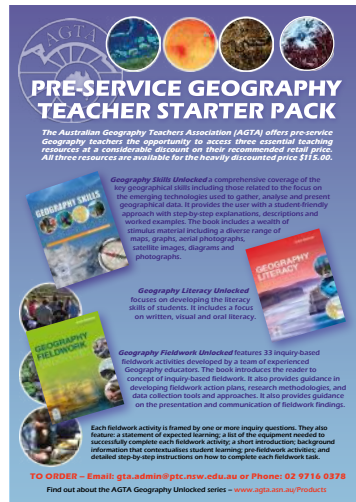

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EUROGEO Mini-Conference 2019, Paris

Teaching Geography in Challenging Times

The European Association of Geographers celebrated its 40th anniversary by holding a mini-conference in Paris on March 14-15. About 90 geography educators attended with more than half visiting from outside France. Seventy one papers were presented including two keynote addresses and two workshops. The focus of the conference was underlined by the Climate Strike by school students in 130 cities the following Saturday.

Enormous threats such as climate change, complex political and economic crises, territorial fighting and related issues are intensifying. As a result we are experiencing a period of dramatic and

arguably irrevocable change within a wider context of turbulence in society. The result has been a great deal of polarization within our communities. With so much change and daily turmoil we are often asked to respond to questions and concerns about the world.

Geography has the potential to respond to these challenges. We believe that geographical knowledge and geographical perspectives play an increasingly important role in our technology-oriented society where the study of place, space and process can help us understand and solve real-world problems. Indeed, by using geographic information, we can actively construct, analyze and present different aspects of the world and act on these representations.

EUROGEO 2019 'Teaching geography in challenging times' provided opportunities to discuss the role and potential of Geography to solve today- and future issues as well as to respond to needs of society and the world.

The launch of the new WA ATAR Geography Units 1 & 2 textbook has been extremely successful and well received by students and teachers. Written, produced and published by GAWA, the text addresses geographical knowledge, skills and understandings of the Yr 11 ATAR and Yr 12 General geography courses.

In an attempt to keep the annual conference interesting, innovative and able to fulfil teachers professional learning needs effectively, several 'Immersion Courses' were offered and extended presentation/ workshop sessions.

The aim of 'Immersion Courses' was this was to give teachers a full day's programme to develop deep knowledge, understanding and skills in one area of interest.

1. Drones in Geography by Benn Watts and Nick Buzza, Albury TAFE

Session 1. Learn the Remotely Piloted Aircraft Systems (RPAS) CASA rules and regulations

Session 2. Learn how to operate a RPAS device and collect data for the classroom

Session 3: Analysing and working with RPAS data

A highlight was flying drones inside ANZ stadium.



2. Fieldwork skills & techniques in natural and built environments in SOP by Danielle Leggo from Sydney Olympic Park.

3. The GIS Geography Classroom by Skye Rodger, ESRI Australia.

A highlight was walking to the new RFS headquarters, collecting urban heat island fieldwork data using Survey123 on the way and seeing real world state of the art GIS in action.



The conference also offered longer (2.5 hour) for combined presentation / workshop sessions. These included:

1. Regenerating Australia's natural landscapes: processes and strategies coupled with Landscape Regeneration in practice using visuals and practical demonstrations by Luke Peel and Peter Hazell from the Mulloon Institute.

2. A day in the life of a geospatial scientist and drone pilot by Dr Karen Joyce from JQU and She Maps.

Feedback from participants was very positive. Responses to the question 'Do you have any suggestions for improving the content and/or organisation of this conference in 2020?' included:

- *More of the day long programs please*
- *The full day drone workshop was an excellent mix of information and practical.*
- *One day sessions. In the past I have learned a lot from the conference but then found it difficult to implement back at school. By focusing on one thing for the day (spatial technologies), I got a lot cemented in my mind and am planning to incorporate it next term.*

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GTAQ

It's an exciting time in Queensland with the release of the new Senior Syllabus for Geography. we are fielding a number requests for support, ranging from where to access relevant data, how to set up communities of practice, and professional learning across a range of topics - spatial technology, fieldwork and data analysis being the most requested. We will largely target our professional learning activities around developing teacher capacity for the new senior syllabus, however, aside from content, the skills are applicable for teaching Geography at all levels

During Term 2 we presented our first professional learning days with several workshops across the state focused on developing fieldwork skills; including transforming and analysing data for both anthropogenic and natural environments. We are currently developing a professional learning package for beginning and out of field teachers. This is an introduction to key skills for Geography which we will offer as twilight sessions. We continue to look for collaboration opportunities with schools across the state to facilitate delivery of professional learning afar.

We completed the process of strategic planning at the end of last year and the culmination of the process has resulted in a reinvigorated Council with a clear vision and purpose for the Association for the coming years. The engagement of an external consultant for this process was exceptionally productive. With a diversity of stakeholders involved in

the process. We reflected on our members feedback, the strengths and weaknesses as well as opportunities to grow and remain a viable association. The outcome has been a refocused vision statement - Excellence in Geographical Education; a clear articulation of our values - Empowerment, Integrity, Sustainability, Expertise; and distinct mission – Supporting geography teachers across Queensland and promoting excellence in geographical education. The AGM in February saw some old and new faces elected to the 2019 Council and we now have a Council of 14 members including new representatives from the Gold Coast.

As hosts of the AGTA2019 Conference in October we are also excited to sponsor Kerry O'Brien as the keynote speaker.

The conference program provides four workshop streams, something for everyone, with expert presenters from education, academia and industry:

- Digital Technology Innovation
- Curriculum Innovation
- Pedagogy Innovation
- Expert Content Knowledge

This year the Conference Tuesday has been dedicated to a series of whole day Masterclasses where delegates will have the opportunity to work with an expert in a field to develop a deep understanding of the relevant content and skills. The fieldwork program encompasses a diverse range of topics – tourism, ecosystems, food security, land cover transformation and spatial technology in the field. In addition to these fantastic professional learning opportunities there are some great social events that take advantage of the conference location on the beautiful Gold Coast.
